BRTC's Dillion Teaches Defensive Tactics

BRTC campus safety officer Dane Dillion assisted BRTC Law Enforcement Training Academy (LETA) by offering a week-long officer defensive training course called Krav Maga. Dillion said the course teaches cadets how to "take control of a situation using the least amount of force necessary."

After a few hours in the classroom, cadets spent the week in drills and hands-on training. In order to make the training as realistic as possible and to prepare officers for real life situations, Dane said all 42 cadets and trainers were in the men's locker room performing drills. "Police officers have to be able handle a situation while protecting themselves without second thought wherever a problem occurs," Dane explained.

We are working with all students to insure their educational goals are not effected. Being on probation means BRTC cannot create any brand new programs while on probation. However, rest assured that all current programs are unaffected, in-

cluding the recently approved ag program.
